Where do we start?

Family. Friends. First responders.

Your first line of defense during an overdose. When drug use turns deadly, minutes count and the availability of an Opioid Overdose Kit can be the difference between life and death. Let us show you when and how to use the kit.

For many people with Opioid Use Disorder, an overdose can be a turning point, the acceptance that their drug use has reached a crisis point and that they need and want help. It may also be a



time for their families to seek support.

Recovery is a path, and your needs may change along the way.

Finding the right help at the right time can be a challenge which is why your community has chosen to participate in the NH Project FIRST.

Finding treatment

There are many types of treatment: what would work best for YOU?

For some people, it starts with a medical assessment and emergency care. For other people, it means beginning detoxification in a safe setting with medical care to ease the symptoms of withdrawal.

One Size Does Not Fit All

Opioid use disorder often coexists with mental health issues such as depression and anxiety and can lead to other medical health issues such as Hepatitis C. After a thorough assessment, you and your counselor can choose the treatment that is best for you.

Treatment may include:

- detoxification
- behavioral counseling
- medication assisted treatment
- residential rehabilitation services
- intensive outpatient programs
- individual, group, peer and/or non-peer recovery support
